Message from the Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. Emmett L. Dunn

June 2021

Dear Friends,

few weeks ago, I went through some boxes searching for some legal documents and came across papers and correspondences dating back to the early 1940s. These historical documents contained much fascinating information. There were receipts from global partners acknowledging Lott Carey's financial contributions, letters from churches and individuals detailing their support, and pictures that told stories of the joys and challenges of missional engagement across the seas. While I found it all exciting and, to some extent, impressive, what took me by surprise was a magazine dated March 1952, with the caption, "Pilgrimage to Liberia, West Africa." On the magazine's cover is a picture of Dr. Wendell C. Somerville and 21 pilgrims standing on the stairs



of Pan American World Airways. The group consisted of 14 men and seven women. At first, I assumed that these were all pastors and their wives, only to discover that these women were all missional leaders in their own rights except for one. I was not only impressed but encouraged, and most of all, inspired.

History reminds us that life for African Americans in the 1950s was guaranteed to be extremely difficult, especially in the South, where segregation and Jim Crow laws were the order of the day. Despite all these setbacks, this group of 21 and so many others believed in the mission and ministry of Lott Carey that they sacrificially gave of themselves, their time, and resources, to invest in the future development of communities around the world, to ensure that little boys and girls would have access to basic education and health

care. Access that they themselves were denied here in the United States of America. What an inspiration. What an encouragement. We are today because of these trailblazers.

It is now 70 years since that group of 21 embarked upon that pilgrimage. Our world is much different from 70 years ago, but the mission is still the same, Touching Lives with Transforming Love. Boys and girls still need education, the sick still need to be attended to, injustice still needs to be addressed, and the lost still need the gospel preached. I rejoice in the fact that much has been accomplished with your help and God's favor, but much more is still required if we must continue to extend the love of Christ to our brothers and sisters living amid challenging conditions.

Funding the mission of Lott Carey has always been a challenge, but especially over the last fifteen months. The impact of the pandemic will be felt in the foreseeable future. So let the encouragement, and the inspiration of our former leaders serve as a clarion call to action.

As we come to the end of another fiscal year, June 30, 2021, I offer you my sincere thanks and appreciation for all the support you have rendered thus far. Your support has enabled us to respond to the needs of our international partners and persons right here in the United States. Included in this publication is a list of our mission impact covering the period under review, none of which would have been possible without your assistance. Thank You!



- In Jamaica, we continue to provide skills training for young adults to give them alternatives to crime and addiction.
- In Guyana and India, we continue to provide general healthcare for the poor and services for people with HIV and AIDS so that mothers, children, and families can be healthier and more whole.
- In Ethiopia and South Africa, we continue to help victims of sexual slavery to be rescued, to recover, and rebuild lives of hope and meaning.

In Guyana

e continue to provide academic support for Guyanese school children, especially those in rural communities with little or no access to modern technology. For example, we partner with primary schools in rural communities to help with the printing and distribution of school lessons. We have also purchased cell phones for some children in our urban centers so they can access the online school sessions.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, Guyana Missionary Baptist Church-Lott Carey has been distributing food hampers to families with food insecurities. Thanks to a generous grant recently obtained from Lott Carey we will be able expand this project.

The A. Carlyle Miller Health Center, a partnership of the Guyana Missionary Baptist Church-Lott Carey and the Ministry of Health continues to provide primary and preventive health care in a courteous, professional, and personalized manner to the people at Long Creek and its environs on the Linden Soesdyke highway.

In India

Mobile Clinic Faridabad - New Delhi, India

ndia remains the epic center of the COVID-19 pandemic. Medical infrastructure is collapsing, hospitals are turning away patients because of severe bed and oxygen shortages, and doctors and nurses themselves have been hit with COVID-19. Still, The Lott Carey Baptist Mission (LCBM) remains faithful in the operation of six infirmaries and five mobile clinics, doing all it can to help coronavirus patients and leprosy victims normally seen.







In Liberia

n Saturday, May 8, 2021, the Lott Carey Baptist Mission School hosted the vaccination team from the Ministry of Health who administered the first does of the AstraZeneca vaccine to LCBMS staff and residents of the Virginia/Brewerville community; 110 persons received the COVID-19 vaccination. Negotiations are ongoing with the Ministry of Health to set another date, to come to campus and continue the vaccination campaign for their community. Nutritious meal packages were delivered to Rev. K-Leb Domah, Pastor and Executive Director of Church Without Walls, a ministry to homeless folks and those dealing with drug addiction.

Several boxes of the prepackaged meals were presented to the Liberia School for the Blind for the students and staff. The Lott Carey Memorial Chapel has a brand-new roof thanks to the very generous donation from Lott Carey in partnership with the Lott Carey Baptist Mission School Alumni Association – USA Chapter.



In Zimbabwe

n partnership with the African Baptist Church Zimbabwe, Lott Carey was able to distribute food to hundreds of individuals who face hyper-inflation, government mismanagement, and natural disasters. To date, farmers have received seed and more than 1,000 people in about 300 households have received mealie meal, sugar, flour and cooking oil. Several allotments of these household essentials continue to be distributed with the expectation of feeding 2,500 people. Households with teenage girls also received a supply of sanitary products, and support groups have been formed to educate individuals about COVID-19.

Domestic Impact

Thanks to collaboration with our partners in Disaster Relief, Lott Cary has done the following—

In Alexandria, Baton Rouge, Jennings, Lake Charles, and New Orleans, Louisiana:

- 74 boxes of food distributed by the United Education Missionary Baptist Association to residents of Alexandria, Louisiana.
- 500 boxes of food distributed by St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church to residents of Jennings, Louisiana.
- 6,000 boxes of food distributed PLUS 260 containers of games, hygiene kits, cleaning supplies distributed by the Lake Charles Hope Complex.
- 1,500 boxes of cleaning supplies distributed by the American Red Cross to Louisiana State University students; 71 volunteers recruited to assist with set-up and distribution of meals and supplies.
 - 1 1 groups provided support to help clean-up debris and much more.
 - 13 organizations provided food to feed the community.
 - 1 companies provided supplies for distribution.
 - 2 Universities assisted with clean-up and delivery of meals and gift cards to seniors; 60 student volunteers assisted in this effort.

In Houston and Dallas-Fort Worth, Texas:

- 20 churches in the Dallas-Fort Worth areas provided financial assistance for restoration of facility from the effects of Shirley ice storm.
- 10 churches in collaboration with the Dallas Baptist Ministers' Union, received financial assistance to repair damaged plumbing.

In Jackson, Mississippi:

• In partnership with The Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference Coalition, financial support was provided to pastors to purchase water, groceries, and other items needed for the congregations and communities.

Thriving in Ministry – Pilgrimages of Striving and Thriving

In January 2021, Lott Carey released a new podcast series that draws from the wisdom of Black pastors. "Pilgrimages of Striving of Thriving" explores how Black pastoral leaders in the United States flourish in their various ministerial contexts.

The podcast series is set to deliver 36 interview-based episodes, each highlighting a prominent Black pastoral leader. Production on the series, produced jointly by Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Inc. and Good Faith Media, began shortly after it was announced in August 2020. A new 30-minute episode is being released each Wednesday on all major podcasting platforms and at LottCarey.org.
