I count it a joy to have the opportunity to share with you a summary of work accomplished for the period under review. My service as the 6th Executive Secretary-Treasurer/CEO of our beloved Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention began on November 1, 2019. I came to this ministry opportunity with a deep sense of gratitude to God for his divine favor, to the Executive Search Committee and Board of Directors for their confidence in my leadership, and to the entire Lott Carey family for their commitment to walk alongside me in service to our global family. I am perpetually grateful for the cooperation received from Board Chairman, Dr. John M. Alexander, Jr., President Gregory Jackson, members of the Executive Committee, Board of Directors, our global partners, pastors, congregations, and the Lott Carey office staff. Without their support,

all of our efforts would have proven futile, especially in this season of unprecedented challenges. While these last few months have not been all smooth sailing, I rejoice because of the faithfulness of God and the sacrificial support of the Lott Carey family. Contained in this volume are the stewardship reports of activities of our global mission partners and domestic staff. I trust that these narratives will provide a window, offering you a glimpse into Lott Carey’s missional thrust. As you digest the stories and reflect on the challenges, know that you are a part of these stories. You aided us in changing the context of the marginalized, the voiceless, the disenfranchised, and those offering leadership in their communities. Because of your prayers and financial support, Lott Carey was able to do what we do best; *Touch Lives with Transforming Love. Thank You!*

Our missional thrust is informed by Lott Carey’s Mission and our five-year strategic drivers. I have included both as a reminder and a focus, as we give thanks for where we have been, to celebrate where we are, and to contemplate where we are headed.

Our Mission

The Lott Carey Global Christian Missional Community extends the Christian witness around the world. Through prayer partnership, financial support, and technical assistance, we come alongside indigenous communities to support ministries of evangelism, compassion, empowerment, and advocacy. Together, we are touching lives with transforming love.

 - Grow network, church, and individual partnerships in the South and Southeast.

4. Strengthen youth engagement (Children and Youth)
 - Develop and distribute a toolkit to implement regional Hope Missionary Days.

 - Create project opportunities that connect and equip youth for leadership and service.
5. Widen young adult involvement (Millennials and Generation X)
 - Develop Emerging Leaders Gathering for ages 18 – 24 with a focus on college campuses.
 - Design regional service impact weekends in North America for Millennials and Generation X.
 - Engage younger pastors for greater involvement and leadership.
6. Provide missions education and leadership training (congregational, pastoral and seminary)
 - Implement an additional Doctor of Ministry in global leadership partnership with an accredited graduate theological school.
 - Implement a master's degree partnership accessible to global and domestic students.
 - Implement digital visual and audio capacity for missions' education and leadership formation.
7. Fortify organizational strength
 - Enlarge network of congregational and individual donors.
 - Increase giving amounts from existing donors.
 - Expand administrative capacity to manage resources and partnerships.

Dealing with the Unexpected

To say that this season of the year 2020 is challenging would be an understatement. What started as a year full of excitement and anticipation, was very quickly changed into one of uncertainties brought on by the onslaught of COVID-19. Like the rest of the world, we had to institute measures to safeguard the interest of Lott Carey and come up with creative ways to maintain the operations of the International office and to avoid any interruption in our commitment to our global partners. During normal times, the third quarter of the fiscal year (January – April), always presents us with financial challenges as most churches begin sending

their contributions in the fourth quarter (April – June). The fact that churches, our primary support base, were also impacted negatively, we were faced with an even more daunting task of trying to respond to COVID-19 requests, while at the same time, endeavoring to meet our monthly obligations to our partners. We found ourselves in uncharted territory. Notwithstanding the setbacks, we succeeded in achieving our budgetary support to our partners and aiding in the fight against COVID-19. *Thank you!*

In addition to the financial strain brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, we were forced to cancel several major events in the interest of the health and safety of everyone. These events included the Annual Spring Mission Conference, the Youth Seminar, regional and association rallies, short-term mission teams, and staff mission visits. We did, however, manage to conduct the business of the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors with the use of online platforms.

On-Going Support – *Touching Lives, One Mission at a Time*

- In **Kenya, Nigeria, and Haiti**, we continue to support churches, pastors, and community impact ministries.
- In **Zimbabwe**, we continue to provide theological training for pastors and church leaders so that they can lead congregations in transformational ministries.
- In **Liberia**, we continue to provide high-quality education to help children become builders and leaders in a country still suffering from many years of civil unrest.
- In **Jamaica**, we continue to provide skills training for young adults to give them alternatives to crime and addiction.
- In **Guyana and India**, we continue to provide general health care for the poor and services for people with HIV and AIDS so that mothers, children, and families can be healthier and more whole.
- In **Ethiopia and South Africa**, we continue to help victims of sexual slavery to be rescued, to recover, and rebuild lives of hope and meaning.

COVID-19 Response – “Answering the Call”

- In **Zimbabwe**, we assisted with the purchase of Personal Protective Equipment and food.
- In **Guyana**, we provided academic support for Guyanese school children, especially those in rural communities with little or no access to modern technology.
- In **Haiti**, we provided financial assistance for both the orphanage and elderly home at **Mission of Grace**. And, we aided through, **L Union Strategic De Englezes**, a conglomerate of Churches, in assisting children whose parents died due to the Coronavirus.
- In **Liberia**, we provided food assistance for faculty and staff at the Lott Carey Mission Schools in Bopula and Brewerville.
- In **Jamaica**, we provided both monetary and psycho-social support to leaders and congregations experiencing enormous challenges directly related to the virus.
- In **Nigeria**, we made a capital investment in preparation for the reopening of schools after the COVID-19 lockdown concludes.
- In **South Africa**, we provided financial assistance to the Mamelodi Baptist Church soup kitchen serving the poor and homeless communities and providing food parcels for pastors.
- In **Kenya**, we provided financial assistance to Kipsitet Baptist Church Clinic for the purchase of COVID-19 test kits.
- In the **U.S.**, we provided web-based resource information to our churches, produced and distributed face masks, assisted with grant writing, and offered prayer support.

Fund Development – Together, we can do more!

Lott Carey has always depended on the sacrificial contributions from our churches and individuals to support our mission. During the last fiscal year (July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020), we experienced a significant drop in giving, especially from our churches. This did not come as a surprise. Staying connected and maintaining the level of ministry pre-COVID-19 remains a challenge for most churches. As such, we have embarked upon a fund development strategy; a strategy focused upon reaching individuals interested in supporting the mission of Lott Carey. We are incredibly confident in the quality of the ministry opportunities we offer through the Lott Carey network, and the impact we have through our international partners’ engagements. The cost to maintain this level

of influence is continuously on the rise, and the global economy’s downturn due to COVID-19 is expected to have a negative impact on mission donations for the foreseeable future. We encourage each person connected with Lott Carey to consider making a monthly contribution and commit to recruiting others to do the same. January through March’s typical pattern of giving creates enormous stress for the office staff in conducting the convention’s on-going operations and supporting our partners. Consistent monthly revenue intake will significantly improve our financial outlook and enable us to respond to needs when called upon. We currently have 12,000+ contacts in our data management system. Imagine if each of these persons would make a monthly contribution of \$10.00, we could raise \$1.2 million dollars annually. Add this amount to gifts from our churches, and we will meet this year’s fiscal budget of 2.2 million dollars. We can do it! *Together, we can do more!*

Looking Ahead

As we enter a new fiscal year, our prayer is that God will provide the needed resources to continue the work assigned to our hands. Listed below is an outline of our emphasis for the period July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021.

1. To maintain monthly commitments to our global partners.
2. To develop a strategic fund development plan with emphasis on individual donors.
3. To improve technological infrastructures.
4. To build staff capacity.
5. To establish a member services department.
6. To provide multiple opportunities for Mission Education.

For your commitment to missions, your generosity which ensures that boys and girls get the very best quality education, we say thank you. You have been faithful in prayers, presence and financial resources to our institution for the last 112 years. Your partnership and your unwavering support have given opportunities, changed and impacted lives of young people and their families, our community, nation and our global village. For the many and countless blessings: a wonderful school year, eager students, dedicated and sacrificial administrators, teachers and staff who purpose to make each day exciting, and fun and teachable moments, we offer praises and thanks to God. We are thankful to the Lord for another good and successful school year so far.

The mission of Lott Carey Mission School, for over 100+ years (1908), has been and continues to provide the best quality education in a nurturing,

caring, and learning environment. We value our heritage as a Christian institution of learning. We value our emphasis on academic excellence. We value our commitment on creating and sustaining a learning community, where administrators, teachers, staff and students grow together. **Character, Industry and Scholarship** is our watchword, our motto.

Education is a key component for the security and wellbeing of a community and a country, especially so with our post-civil war context. Preparing the minds and hearts of new generations of Liberians for leadership and contribution is our goal. Our commitment to education for girls and boys, as well as special literacy programs for adults who have not had the opportunity for quality formal education further extends our reach and influence. Our commitment over the past century is a testament to the fact that LCM is positioned to ensuring the rebuilding of this country by investing in the human resource for a sustained and prosperous nation Liberia.

The very foundation of this school was built on and through the evangelization of the gospel of Jesus Christ. This remains front and center even as we work to affect the whole person – spiritual, academic and recreational. The spiritual emphasis is through daily devotions, bible clubs, bible teaching, being examples for the students to see and other activities and programs which help to steer and influence their person.

We provide education with a Christian emphasis. This is important, especially so now that we find ourselves in a pluralistic culture. We have a unique opportunity, not only to offer the best quality education, but also to present our faith. We have many Muslims and persons of other faith persuasions within our context who come to our institution seeking quality education. We have a 45% youthful population as a nation, with about 1.5 million school-aged children. In the communities where our schools are located, we directly and indirectly touch and impact the lives of about 100,000 persons/families easily.

LCM is in the vanguard to provide the very best educational opportunities. Our students always score high marks during the West Africa Senior High School Certificate Exams (WASSCE), which are mandatory for all 12th graders in the West African Sub-region. In this light we have committed ourselves to providing the facilities needed to enhance education by working continuously to improve and equip our science labs, and to be staffed to adequately prepare

our students for the exams. The students are doing practical work and experiments in the laboratory. Our students and other schools are utilizing our school's library for research and reading assignments. Each class has mandatory library hours during the week. We also initiated a reading program in the elementary division, encouraging our students to check out books to read at home with their parents. We need to work on providing internet and computer access to students, which we hope to improve as resources become available to obtain and maintain this service.

Lott Carey distinguishes herself as one of the very best secondary educational institutions in our country. We were recognized and commended by the Cummings Africa Foundation, and the West African Examination Council for maintaining a **97 percent** passing average on the National Exams for the past 5 consecutive years. Each year scores of students hope to get enrolled in our school. We intentionally limit and control enrollment so as not to shortchange our educational program. Emphasis is on quality, not quantity. We do our best to maintain class sizes in keeping with internationally acceptable standards. This engenders a better learning environment with more time for teacher-student interaction. The campus is designated as a testing center for the WASSCEE Regional Exams, so students from other schools are sent to our campus to write their exams.

We have a unique opportunity for evangelism within our midst. Our reputation for academic excellence attracts students seeking to have their candles lit at the "bright flame" of knowledge, including Muslim students, and those of other faiths. This provides us with a great opportunity to present the gospel through daily chapel devotions, Bible instruction in classes and regular spiritual emphases. We have witnessed many of these students who privately professed their faith in Jesus Christ as Lord, and trust the Holy Spirit will work with and through them to one day make a public profession. We have watched and followed several of graduates who continue with the Christian values instilled in them. Over the years, we have had several students who made professions of faith during spiritual emphasis weeks, and are eager to learn the scriptures, and/or sing in the school choir. We presented them with Bibles. Some of them keep their Bibles on campus because they can't take them home. Please pray for these students that God's Spirit will surround them, protect them, and use them in His own time to be a witness to their families.

This partnership is vital and important because it

is the continuation of the dreams and vision of our forebears, who made tremendous sacrifices and contributions for the establishment of this Institution over 100 years ago. With fervor, commitment, generously, they supported the school with their time, talents and treasures leaving for us a very rich heritage and legacy of missional support and commitment to providing quality education here in Liberia. Since 1908, the Lott Carey Baptist Mission School has stood as a bastion of the best in Christian mission education.

The Lott Carey Schools Liberia is comprised of two campuses, one urban (in Brewerville) and the other rural (Bopulu). Our student population from both campuses is as follows: LCM Bopulu Campus, Gbarpolu County with 247 students enrolled from K through 9th grade (Female -98, Male- 149; and our LCM Campus in Brewerville, Montserrado County (K through 12th grade) with 303 students enrolled Female- 180, Male- 123). We have a total of 122 persons employed serving both campuses in various capacities –administration, academics, admissions, health services, maintenance and Agriculture.

There are many opportunities for special projects and mission teams to come and participate with our students and school family. Such include but not limited to:

- ❖ Ongoing Professional Development Training for teachers and staff to constantly gain new insights and skills to make our school more student friendly while producing high performing students.
- ❖ Work teams to help with the renovation of buildings on the campus.
- ❖ Mission teams to come over and lead Spiritual Emphasis programs which, in turn, lead to decisions for Christ among the student populace and staff. Teams are also needed to teach and train students for personal evangelism within their communities.
- ❖ Volunteers who will come and work alongside us to lead various summer camps (STEM camps, Music camp, Sports camp, VBS camp).
- ❖ Other ideas for special projects include the collection of school/office/teacher supplies, collection of hygiene products (washcloths, toothbrushes/toothpaste, bath soap or shower

gel, and skin lotion), underclothes for students (all sizes for female and male students), and sanitary supplies for students' use. These various items can be collected and shipped to Liberia through the A & H Trucking & Shipping Company with offices in Hyattsville, MD, USA.

The global COVID-19 pandemic has greatly affected our ministry and schooling, like every other institution. The COVID-19 virus entered Liberia in early March, and as a precautionary health measure to minimize the infection rates in the country, all schools, churches and business were ordered closed, a State of Emergency and Lockdown was issued by the government. Health protocols were instituted nationwide –mandatory wearing of masks, daily washing of hands, social distancing, among others.

The lockdown instituted to mitigate the spread of the virus created real hardships for families, small businesses, schools, churches and many other institutions. The economic fallout and hardships are as grave, and in some instances worse, than the virus itself. Many persons lost jobs and their small businesses, rendering them unable to take care of daily family needs. The last three months have been really, really difficult. With the abrupt closure of schools, we lost all income to operate the school and all its functionaries. Absolutely no operational funds are available. We had not been able to pay salaries since March. Thankfully, with support from the Lott Carey Board, we were finally able to pay salaries for 1 month, and have been assured of financial support from the Lott Carey head offices to ensure we can pay the balance of salaries owed to staff.

The uncertain future of curtailing this virus will greatly affect our work. Due to the fact that some families lost income and jobs, we will likely lose students, thus affecting enrollment and income for the next academic year.

We therefore solicit your daily and fervent prayerful support for:

- ❖ The safety and good health of all of our staff, students and their families, our school community, our country and the world. The sooner this virus can be contained or eradicated, the better it will be for us all.
- ❖ Opportunities and resources to add value to our academic program, through the infusion of vocational skills programs, thus preparing our

students for the workforce immediately after graduation from high school.

- ❖ To upgrade our school with technology – (computers and internet connectivity) to help prepare our students to be functional literates in this technologically advancing world. Our students cannot afford to be left behind.
- ❖ That volunteers will come our way and work alongside us to teach, train teachers, lead various summer camps, work teams to help with the renovation of buildings on the campus.
- ❖ Pray with and for our students and their families for the Lord's provision and protection. Also pray for their salvation.
- ❖ Please pray with us, our staff and their families, for their safety and good health, and their overall wellbeing.
- ❖ Please pray for our students and their families that they will be safe and well, that their families will have financial needs met, and that parents will be able to pay tuition fees for their children enrolled at Lott Carey School.
- ❖ We pray for sustained and increased financial support to enable us to continue to do the good work we are doing. We do not want to shortchange our school's high standards and achievements due to diminished or reduced financial support.
- ❖ We pray for the Ministry of Education and Health Authorities as they make decisions affecting the health and wellbeing of all citizens and residents of this country, especially as it relates to students, teachers and staff.
- ❖ We pray, as we anticipate the reopening of school, we will all (students, staff, and administration) follow necessary health protocols and guidelines, so that we will all keep safe and well. We pray we will bring the academic school year to a peaceful and successful closure.

We are grateful and glad to be in the Lord's service and always amazed and in awe that the Lord chooses to invite us to work alongside him.

Seventy-six years have passed since Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission came to India, a country on the other side of the globe, to extend a helping hand to the poor and needy of our country, especially leprosy patients, and untouchables. The beginning was very humble, but the Good Lord, who fed more than 5000 people with a mere five loaves of bread and two fish, was with us. He made us prosper in all our endeavours so that we could serve more and more people in our country, and be a blessing to many.

People like Rev. John Nelson, Rev. Abner F. Nelson, and Dr. (Mrs) Ivy Frey Nelson, the first three Superintendents of the Mission in India, did pioneering work to establish the Mission firmly on the strongest foundation, Jesus Christ. We gratefully remember the sacrificial financial help from our brothers and sisters of The United States of America. May our Lord bless all our supporters and well-wishers richly, for their charity and care for people

whom they have not even seen.

The original focal points for the Mission were: 1. preaching, 2. teaching, and 3. healing. Only the volume and dimensions have increased manifold since the inception of the Mission.

Please find below a condensed report of the various fields in which the Mission works in India.

I. Ministry of Preaching

By the grace of God, we were blessed with two more churches during the report year, and now we have eight churches and four prayer groups. Rev. C.V. Valson, with unmatched zeal and enthusiasm for the Lord's work, first joined the mission as Pastor of Abner Nelson Memorial First Baptist Church, Anandgram Leprosy Colony, when we had only three churches. Now, within a decade, with his leadership and God's blessing, the number of churches has grown to eight.

Children and their trainers show great enthusiasm, participating in activities and singing choruses and hymns praising the Lord.

This church also hosts an annual Gospel Convention, led by renowned evangelists and speakers.

The Mission has seven Non-formal Education Projects in the states of Delhi, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh. This year we added one more Non Formal Education

Project.

The school, fully supported by the Mission, is located in Meerut, Uttar Pradesh. The children participate with enthusiasm in all school activities. This is the first non-formal school for poor children established by the Mission in 1950. It is heartening to see grandchildren of the first Nursery students of this school are now studying where their grandfathers studied.

b) Somerville Non Formal Education Project-

This is a project exclusively for children of the stone quarry workers, who live in slums in the vicinity and migrate to other work sites where they get jobs. Since the land is not owned by the Mission, no expansion activities can be undertaken here.

g) Ankur Project held at Somerville School, NOIDA, after regular school hours in partnership with Army, Navy, Air Force Wives Activity Trust (ANAWA Trust).

Ankur Project

The meaning of the word Ankur in Hindi is Sprout or Seedling. Through this project, in partnership with a charitable organisation of the wives of military officers, The Mission serves around 400 children from slums and nearby villages in NOIDA. The Mission provides use of some classrooms to the ANAWA Trust at the Somerville School, NOIDA, after school hours. The Mission also provides two buses to fetch the children from their homes and drop them back, free of cost.

This gesture, on our part, has been most satisfying, as these little ones can live with dignity in a just society and help their families and future generations get out of the perpetual vortex of poverty and want. It is a pleasure to see their enthusiasm and happiness to study in the same class rooms as privileged children, after the school hours.

h) Scholarships and Financial Aid to Poor and Needy

Approximately 266 students were supported by Mission during the reporting year for their education and hostel expenses. Thirteen of these students received training in nursing courses.

The Mission provides financial aid to many poor and needy persons, be it for their medical treatment or setting up small scale business ventures so that they can feed their families.

Public Schools of the Mission

The Mission has four public schools affiliated with the Central Board of Secondary Education. The schools are well known for their academic excellence, discipline, and for instilling the right values in young minds. The children are mainly from middle and upper middle class families in and around Delhi. The total strength of the four schools is nearly 10,000. The schools are financially self-supporting.

This school opened in 2013. Capacity is nearly 4000 students; however, being a new school, the student strength is much less than the capacity. The school is fully air-conditioned and each class has been provided air purifiers. Dr. Gregory K Moss Sr., former President of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, blessed the school building in November 2012, in the presence of the former Executive Secretary/Treasurer of Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, Dr. David Emmanuel Goatley.

Involvement of Somerville School Students in Social Work

Monthly rations are given to 29 families of HIV/AIDS patients by the school children. During the Christmas season, students collect various gift items and present them to children of our Non-Formal Education Projects, who are from economically backward sections of the society. In this way we encourage our students to participate in community welfare work from an early age.

III. Ministry of Healing

a) HIV/AIDS awareness project

Our Mission started one of the first clinics/mini hospitals with 7 beds for HIV/AIDS patients. However, due to the large number of patients who required services in this area and our inability to cope with the increasing number of patients, we had to close down the clinic. We are now engaged in an Awareness Programme for the public, especially those who belong to the marginalised sections of society, to prevent the spread of this fatal disease. Magic Shows and Street plays are conducted every week and local people, who are generally poor and uneducated, eagerly attend these shows. In this way, we create an awareness of the dangers of HIV/AIDS and the means to avoid this terrible disease.

When I joined the Mission about 46 years ago, there was no proper treatment for Leprosy patients and there were many leprosy patients. Now we have very good medicines to completely cure this dreaded disease, without any deformities. It is an uphill task, however, as there are many fresh cases of leprosy among migrant labourers. Many of them return to their native places,

without giving any information as to their whereabouts. Dr. P.K. Tyagi and Dr. Virender Atreja, our faithful and willing doctors, attend to leprosy patients in the clinics. They also treat general diseases of poor people from surrounding areas.

c) Mobile Clinics

The needs of nearly 8000 patients are attended to by our Mobile Clinic services. These clinics have a tremendous impact on the lives of the poorest of the poor in the area, and for those who cannot even afford travel expenses to reach the nearest government-run hospitals. These mobile clinics take the doctors to the areas where people live. Tens of thousands of lives have been saved by these clinics. Dr. Tyagi, who has been in service with us for more than 40 years, is the driving force behind this project.

Christians are admired for their deeds, not words. Our deeds speak louder than our words. Many people ask us why we are doing this for the poorest of the poor in the land, without any motive of making a profit. Our answer is: the Love of Christ prompts us to do so. Thus, we witness Christ, wherever we carry out charitable activities, or give a value-oriented education to the students under our care.

We need your prayers and support for continuing our medical work among the poorest of the poor in and around Delhi. With your support, we can reach out to those who inhabit other clusters of slums, and offer them medical aid as well. This is our current need and our request to the Convention.

With the blessings of the Lord, and the involvement of the Convention for more than 74 years, we have attained the stature we have now. Sacrificial contributions of our brothers and sisters of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, together with their fervent prayers, are behind all our successes. Please continue to pray for us, as our country goes through the coronavirus pandemic, which has affected our economy and rendered millions jobless. Please remember we are a country of 1.32 billion people. If the coronavirus really hits us hard in the coming days, even if the mortality rate is one percent, there will be 13 million lives lost. My request to my brothers and sisters of the Convention is to pray for us to avert this calamity, while we pray for the end of the pandemic in the United States.

I take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Mary George, President of the Lott Carey Baptist Mission in India and our Chairperson/Director of Somerville Schools, Mrs. D. A. Tressler, for the excellent support and motivation received from them. I am extremely grateful for their valuable cooperation and suggestions for the betterment of the Mission. A special thanks to the Manager of our schools Mr. Abraham Mathew, Principals of our schools, Doctors of the Leprosy Colonies, Pastors of the Churches, and my colleagues and staff, without whose help, the Mission could not have made such steady progress in various fields.

My sincere thanks and appreciation go to Rev. Gregory Jackson, President, Rev. Emmet L. Dunn, Executive Secretary/Treasurer, and Dr. John M. Alexander, Jr., Chairman of the Board of Directors of Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, for their unstinted support, encouragement and prayers, without which we could not have achieved all that we have done thus far. I take this opportunity to thank my brothers and sisters in the Lott Carey Office in the States for their timely help and support. I gratefully acknowledge the help and support of Sister Kathi L. Reid, Program Manager of the Convention, and Sister Tonga R. Peterson, Operations Manager. May God bless you abundantly and reward you for sacrificial and selfless service to uplift the poor in India, and for your genuine care for the masses, half-way across the globe.

The doors for evangelisation are closing down fast. Please pray for us so that labourers in the Lord's vineyard are safe and sound. Once again, I thank my brothers and sisters of member churches of the Convention for their prayers and support. May God continue to bless us as He has always done in the past.

Greetings

First, we would like to thank God for His faithfulness, His love, mercies and protection over our lives and the entire “Lott Carey” family world-wide. May His Name alone be praised. We, here in Nigeria, greet you all in the blessed name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.



On behalf of the Lott Carey family here in Nigeria, we bring you felicitations, wishing you a wonderful 123rd annual session.

Introduction

In 1956, the Late Rev. Charles Etim Ebong returned home to Nigeria after finishing his studies in the United States of America. He came back with a dream of building a secondary school for his community, which at the time had none. As an ordained Baptist minister, he also had a desire to establish a Baptist church in his village. Hence, after consulting with the elders of his village, the decision was made to allocate to him a piece of land for a church building. Later that year his senior brother also allotted some land that would be used to establish a school. Two years later, the first Baptist Church in the entire Enyong Division of eastern Nigeria was established, and opened its doors for worship. That was the beginning of the Baptist movement in southern areas of Nigeria.

In 1960, two years later, Rev. Ebong established a secondary school and named it after himself, St. Charles College.

However, our partnership with Lott Carey was

established following a 1963 visitation by the then president of the Lott Carey Baptist Mission Convention, Dr. Hairston, and a team of 20 missionaries. Our relationship has flourished since then, and over the years our primary focus has been evangelism, the planting and nurturing of churches, education through the establishment of nursery, primary vocational and secondary schools, and of course theological training.

Health Care was been developed via the establishment of a Primary Health Care Centre. However, in the early 1970’s we withdrew from health care ministry because the government began to aggressively build primary health care centers in different areas of our endeavors. The funds once spent there were now allocated to our educational Ministries.

Over the years we have also found ourselves involved in emergency relief programs during communal clashes, economic development projects and recently, the distribution of palliatives, i.e. welfare packages during this year’s COVID-19 pandemic.

The Importance of Ministries

Upholding our belief that all people have the right to discover their God-given potential and maximize these to the glory of God, Lott Carey--Nigeria has decided to intentionally pursue efforts in rural areas of Southern Nigeria. These areas have some cultural and traditional beliefs of witchcraft, necrolatry, necromancy, divinations, and worshiping territorial deities which are intrinsically woven into the fabric of the societal norms.

These belief systems use ignorance, illiteracy, intimidation and manipulation to “keep” the people in check so as to perpetuate themselves. As a result, most of the people were oblivious to the unlimited possibilities and purposes of God concerning their lives as children of God.

With this observed fact, it was important that an avenue for a holistic transformations and emancipation from these negative and suppressive traditional practices and ideologies was made available for a source of an alternative life style.

Importance of Lott Carey’s Partnership

The partnership with Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention came at the most opportune time, as the Baptist movement here in Nigeria began to experience growing pains.

Three year earlier, in 1961, the St. Charles College was closed due to an inability to meet necessary standards

set by the Ministry of Education. The college didn't have enough studies facilities, science equipment, etc. Intervention by "Lott Carey" provided the necessary funds which assisted in the school's reopening for students in 1964. The school was re-named Lott Carey Baptist Secondary School.

Our churches, which were already established in rural and some of the most neglected areas, were unable to service the basic needs of pastors who traveled around from church to church. The partnership with "Lott Carey" later eased that burden and provided the necessary essential support system. One area of assistance most remembered is provision by the Lott Carey Men's Auxiliary of motorcycles for pastors. Before, they had to ride bicycles for hours before reaching their destinations. At that time there were no pastoriums, or parsonages, so they had to travel from home to church every Sunday or sleep in a corner of the church.

A third and major development from the partnership with Lott Carey has been our ability to acquire land for establishing our schools. This has been possible only by the partnership with Lott Carey.

Main Area of Ministry Impact

From the inception of this Mission, the vision of the founders was to establish and nurture:

- Sound Christian programs using churches throughout the numerous untapped villages of Nigeria
- Sound Christian Educational Programs to increase understanding by the people of the content and meaning of Holy Scripture as found in the Bible, and consequently eradicate different beliefs and influences of satanic-based traditions.
- Sound Primary Health Care Programs to help control, and if possible, eradicate most of the health issues which plagued these rural areas.
- Establish Educational Institutions which would provide affordable education for rural areas of Southern Nigeria.

With these goals as guide, the main areas of impact have been in alignment with the vision:

- Evangelism
- Education
- Health Care

We have concentrated on the geographic areas of four southern states: Akwa Ibom, Cross River, Rivers and Imo States. Recently we have also worked in the Northern states of Taraba and Adamawa.

- Presently 50 churches are operating under the

auspices of "Lott Carey." These churches are grouped under 10 administrative areas and are referred to as Fields earlier this year.

- Two new House Fellowships were established in Taraba and Adamawa State by the Cross River State Field. These are located in the problematic areas of northeastern Nigeria, but we responded as the need arose.
 - Further Fellowships were established in Nkwot Ikot Eboh and Ukana by the Etim Ekpo Field, and both located in Akwa Ibom State.
 - Presently we have about 62 pastors who pastor these churches.
 - Also, to promote the growth and participation of our members, each church has a Men's Auxiliary, Women's Fellowship Auxiliary, and a Youth Auxiliary. Each auxiliary has programs geared towards a holistic development of its members. Each of these auxiliaries has a national convention every other year, and these are held in different areas of the Mission so as to create an atmosphere of belonging.
 - One of the most active and effective of these auxiliaries is the Women's Fellowship. This group has groomed many women to become active members in their churches, and have created opportunities for self-empowerment through economic ventures, primarily based on agriculture and products for petty trading. This has been done by establishing micro-credit loan units in each of their churches.
- About a year ago, the "Women in Service Everywhere" of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention donated a sum of \$10,000 (US) to the "National Women's Fellowship" to establish a micro-credit revolving loan program for women. This opportunity will eventually impact over 1000 women. Forty women, so far, have received micro-loans for developing Agro-based trading enterprises.

At this point we would like to express our sincere appreciation for such love. This alone will establish the women on a different level of living. We say thank you very much.

Educational Impact

Additionally, over the years, Lott Carey-Nigeria has been able to assist hundreds of students in accomplishing their academic pursuit via scholarships.

Many of these beneficiaries are outstanding citizens who are now contributing to the development of their communities and the country. In the 2019-2020 academic

year, over 35 students were on either partial or full scholarship.

Emmitt Dunn, for their expeditious intervention early May when a powerful windstorm blew off the roof of one of the buildings which houses library, science laboratories, four classrooms, and offices of the Principal and Vice-Principal.

The construction has been completed and we are now in the process of replacing the ceiling, which was also affected by the rains after the roof was blown off. Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 lock down, we could not get to the school earlier enough to secure some of the items in the building. Consequently, some of science laboratories and classrooms were vandalized. This now results in a need for assistance in replacing laboratory apparatus.

We estimate the replacement costs to be about \$3000.00.

Salutation

The Guyana Missionary Baptist Church--Lott Carey (GMBC) extends best wishes to the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention (Lott Carey) on its 123rd Annual Session. We salute The Reverend Gregory Jackson, President of Lott Carey; The Reverend Dr. John

Alexander, Chairman of the Board; Reverend Emmet Dunn, Executive Secretary-Treasurer; all other Lott Carey officers and participants at the 123rd Annual Session taking place virtually under the theme “*God’s Mission During Troubled Times.*” We pray the Holy Spirit will continue to empower and direct the Lott Carey global family as we recommit ourselves to remain faithful to the mission of God.

It is a distinct privilege and honor to provide Lott Carey with the GMBC Annual Report for 2019-2020. Preparing this report has been a disorienting and cathartic experience. It is a struggle to chronicle our ministry in the midst of such rapid global change, but it is cleansing experience to realize we must totally submit to God’s guidance since our carefully crafted plan for mission is now redundant and almost irrelevant.

Origins and Present Focus

This year GMBC is observing its 60th Anniversary, founded in October 1960 by the Reverend Dr. A. Carlyle Miller and Rev. Emeline “Erma” Miller. Marking this milestone has given openings for reflection; occasions for thanksgiving and opportunities for celebration. As we commemorate this watershed in our history, we pause to ponder God’s steadfast love and kindness upon us through the last six decades, and we pray God will grant us wisdom to learn from our past; trust and courage to embrace the present; hope, love, and steadfast faith to face to the future, knowing that with God’s continuous leading, our witness will prevail and prosper.

Our Impact

GMBC’s core values are *community, care, compassion, and generosity.* Traditionally, GMBC congregations minister to approximately 1000 persons weekly. Additionally, our medical clinic serves about 400 patients weekly. However, the year in review has been wrought with very unusual circumstances as we grapple with the effects of the global pandemic caused by the coronavirus, Guyana’s socio-political instability caused by a corrupted electoral process, and the power fight to control Guyana’s e perceived oil wealth.

Community

At GMBC we believe that the church is called to be a community of believers (Acts 2:42-47 and Acts 4:32-35), who desire to follow Christ and live in neighborly relationship with one another. Therefore, GMBC pastors encourage opportunities to foster Christian community amongst congregants. Additionally, GMBC Youth, Women, Men, and Clergy councils work at a national level to coordinate various opportunities to facilitate community amongst GMBC congregations. The Councils bolster teachings that facilitate Christian growth, promoting fellowship and encourage leadership development. Some highlights of our life together during this reporting period are indicated below.

GMBC Youth Council

CBF Youth Festival (July 17 – 21, 2020) This event took place in the in the Turks and Caicos Islands. Four GMBC youth attended the festival. This triennial Youth Festival brings Baptist youth from various member countries and territories to one location to participate in planned activities. During this five-day festival youths participated in activities designed to help them grow in their faith, provide training for capacity building, foster support, encourage fellowship, and participate in mission outreach opportunities. The theme for the festival was: “*Limitless*” (John 3:34). At this meeting

two GMBC leaders were elected to serve on the CBF Youth Executive Committee in the following capacities: Secretary-Treasurer, Min. Oniqueca Grenado; Member-at-Large, Min. Shaunessy Proffitt.

GMBC 16th Biennial Convention Opening Celebration (*September 6, 2019*) The GMBC Youth Council was responsible for planning and hosting opening activities of our 16th Biennial Convention, a Sacred Arts Concert at the Theater Guild of Guyana. More than 300 persons, GMBC various congregations attended. Some of Guyana's top sacred artists were featured.

GMBC Youth Day (*October 20, 2020*) GMBC Youth Council hosted its second Annual Youth Day Service, under the theme "*Growing in Christ: Rooted and Built Up (Colossians 2:6-7)*." This service was held at Calvary Baptist Church. Approximately 150 youths from all our congregations and representatives of the Baptist Convention of Guyana were in attendance. Activities included procession, worship service, and fellowship lunch. Keynote preacher was Rev. Kendrick Walcott, Regional Leader of Guyana Child Evangelism Ministry.

GMBC Fifth Annual Youth Leaders Retreat (*March 6-8, 2020*) Approximately 30 youth gathered at Camp Sommerville, located at Long Creek on the Linden Soesdyke Highway, to participate in the Fifth Annual Youth Retreat. This retreat, designed for all GMBC youth leaders and Sunday school teachers focused on the theme "*Reviving the Mission, Heeding the Vision: Living in Christ as we Grow and Glow (Psalms 82-12-13)*." This event facilitated opportunities for advance planning, capacity building, worship, fun, and fellowship.

GMBC Annual Youth Day of Prayer (*June 14, 2020*) Because of the global pandemic, this was changed to a virtual event via Zoom. We converged under the theme: "*Christian Youth Growing Together Through Prayer*." Approximately 60 persons participated in the event with opportunities for youth to share their testimonies and to pray for each other, our national, regional, and global family. The keynote speaker was Sis Joanne Wood, President of CBF Youth Department.

GMBC Youth Hangouts To facilitate youth fellowship meetings, we launched a virtual youth hangout on Zoom. Youth meet every Sunday at 5:00 pm to connect, share stories and participate in a planned activity. Youth from all of our congregations with internet access participate.

Women's Council

CBF Women's Day of Prayer (*June 3, 2019*) The Women's Council collaborated with the Caribbean Baptist

Women's Union (CBWU) to write the 2019 prayer guide for the CBWU Annual Day of Prayer. This event was guided by the theme: "*Arise, Shine through Service (1 Peter 4:10)*." GMBC Women in God's Service (WINGS) ministries hosted two simultaneous prayer services to observe this event. Approximately 200 women attended.

Thursdays in Black March and Rally (*September 5, 2020*) One of GMBC mission outreach thrusts for this biennial is to support World Council of Churches (WCC) *Thursdays in Black Campaign* to stop gender-based violence (GBV) through advocacy and education. We therefore committed to do the following: Wear black on Thursdays; invite ministry leaders to use their social media platform to speak up and speak out on GBV; encourage pastors to use sermons, and Bible studies to educate persons about GBV; work collaboratively with national agencies to support victims of GBV; stop GBV by reporting perpetrators to the relevant authorities or by referring them for professional help.

During our 16th Biennial Convention Celebration we kicked off our *Thursdays in Black Campaign* with an ecumenical march and rally in Beterverwagting on the East Coast of Demerara. The theme of the march and rally was "*Stop Gender-Based Violence in Guyana*." This march provided public awareness about GBV, while the rally provided opportunities for prayers, testimonies from victims and transformed perpetrators, and speeches by leaders from national agencies working to eliminate GBV. At the rally each person was challenged to do his/her part to stop this scourge. Approximately 300 persons attended this march and rally.

Annual Day of Family Fun and Sports (*October 2019*) The GMBC women's and men's councils co-hosted the Annual Day of Family Fun and sports. Over 500 persons participated in Christian fun and fellowship. Proceeds were donated to the Erma Miller Scholarship Fund. The Moses House emerged as winner of track and field events.

The Women's Council meets monthly on Zoom to ensure various WINGS ministries are receiving appropriate moral and emotional support needed during this pandemic.

Clergy Council

Annual Joint Communion (*December 8, 2019*) The Clergy Council collaborated with Calvary Baptist Church to host the Annual Joint Communion and Stewardship Sunday. The Reverend Kevin Washington, Pastor of Concord Baptist Church, Houston, Texas was keynote speaker. More than 300 persons attended the event at

Umana Yana in Georgetown.

Clergy Retreat (*February 7-9, 2020*) We hosted our 2nd Annual Clergy Retreat under the theme “*Growing in Christ: Nurturing Christian Community (Colossians 2:6-7)*.” Twelve clergy members attended the retreat at the St. Paul Retreat Center, Vryheid Lust, East Coast Demerara, which offered opportunities for clergy renewal and peer collaboration. We are deeply indebted to Reverend Anthony Trufant, and Emmanuel Baptist Church, Brooklyn, New York, for facilitating this retreat. Rev. Trufant’s ministry encouraged, challenged, and inspired our clergy.

Care

Care is practiced in GMBC through ministry to individuals, families, and to the larger communities we serve. We believe each member in our family of faith should be cherished, supported and encouraged in her/his Christian walk. As a church community, we demonstrate care by providing life-long spiritual learning opportunities, prayer support, Christian counseling, and scholarship support for students pursuing their educations.

Sunday Worship Services Christian worship at GMBC involves praising God in music, dance, readings from scripture, prayers of various styles, a sermon, and various holy ceremonies, such as the Lord’s Supper, Baptism. Corporate Worship provides the opportunity for Christians to come together in a group to worship God in the same place. GMBC congregation hosts services for approximately 500 persons weekly.

Bible Studies When believers meet to study God’s word together, they foster accountability, connection, encouragement, and unconditional love. Such an environment also promotes spiritual growth, and helps believers put biblical precepts into practice. Most of our congregations meet for weekly Bible studies with about 150 persons participating.

Prayer Gatherings These gatherings are important because they help create a culture of care within our community. When we take time to pray for and with God’s people, we can listen to the Holy Spirit, and we can see God working in real people during real-life circumstances. Our local churches meet weekly for prayers. Pastors also visit homes to pray with families as needed.

However, due to the Global pandemic our churches have been closed, so we have developed virtual services to facilitate weekly services, prayer meetings and Bible

studies. This has been a difficult adjustment for our members. We provide written resources for persons who do not have internet access. We also encourage persons in these communities to plan and participate in family services in their homes.

Erma Miller Scholarship provides personal and direct care to students taking the next big step in tertiary education. This year scholars included:

- † Erwin Lewis, Ministerial Students, Wesleyan Bible College. He graduated in December 2019 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Christian Ministry.
- † Shusheila Persaud, Biology Student, University of Guyana. She graduated November 2019 with Bachelor of Science degree in Biology.
- † Shaunessy Profitt, Ministerial Student, United Theological College, in Kingston, Jamaica. Shaunessy has completed her second year of studies. Her theological education is funded jointly by Lott Carey, Jamaica Baptist Union (JBU) and GMBC.
- † Tamara Scott, Sociology Student, University of Guyana.
- † Kia Campbell, Engineering student, Guyana Technical Institute.
- † Adrianna London, Culinary Science, Carnegie School Home of Economics.

Compassion

We learn from (Exodus 34:6) that compassion is constitutive of God’s very being. We understand that ministries of compassion most affirm the image of God in the people we serve. Hence, we work hard to ensure our various mission outreach projects help affirm the dignity of the people we serve. During the year in review we joined our partners at the Ministry of Public Health, Ministry of Social Cohesion, Food for the Poor and the Ministry of Education to address health disparities, racial division, hunger/poor nutrition, and educational needs in the communities we serve.

The A. Carlyle Miller Health Center and Cottage Hospital continues to provide invaluable service to people of Long Creek and its environs. This clinic offers stellar service in maternal and child health. We give God thanks for the medical team, for their hard work and committed service.

Distribution Centres GMBC congregations continue to serve as distribution centres for Guyana’s Food for the Poor. We provide food hampers, clothing, school supplies, and household items for families in the communities where GMBC churches are located.

We are extremely grateful to the Bethlehem Baptist Church in McKeesport, Pennsylvania for supporting the food and nutrition program at Abrams Creek. Each month over 50 persons receive hampers with essential food supplies.

Campus Ministry

Charity Secondary School Campus Ministry The Abrams Creek Baptist Church continues to serve secondary school students from the Essequibo region. The Youth Council is currently assisting the missions outreach committee with this ministry. Twice each quarter, a youth council member leads a team of youth from their local church to serve at the Charity Secondary School Campus Ministry. This team also worships and fellowships with the youth of the Abrams Creek Baptist Church.

Beteverwagting Primary School Campus Ministry The Youth Council continues to serve the Beteverwagting Primary School. The Campus Ministry team meets weekly with students for Bible studies.

Learning Clubs We host these in various GMBC congregations on Saturdays. These clubs provide tutoring for primary and secondary school children in various subjects. Students also receive a hearty and healthy snack. These tutoring sessions help students improve grades and perform better on standardized tests. Due to the pandemic, abbreviated versions of our learning clubs have been taking place virtually.

Generosity

Christian Stewardship The psalmist tells us that “The earth is the Lord’s and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it...” At GMBC we understand that God owns everything, and humanity is called to be responsible managers of what belongs to God according to God’s desires and purposes. We strive to be faithful managers of all the resources, abilities, and opportunities God has placed in our care.

Membership

GMBC values every soul that God has placed in our care, and therefore, under the leading of the Holy Spirit, we continue to invest time and resources to ensure the holistic development of each person.

GMBC churches have implemented a variety of Sacred Arts ministries to encourage members to develop their gifts in dance, music, drama, poetry, singing, etc.

Through directed studies and appropriate training programs, our church leaders continue to encourage

persons to find their purpose in God and to live accordingly.

We utilize the Christian education materials from Caribbean Christian Publications for our Sunday School and Bible studies programs.

Partnership

GMBC is grateful for its various partnerships. These partnerships are mutually beneficial to all participants since they unify and strengthen our Christian witness.

- † Lott Carey: We are grateful to the Global Lott Carey family for your partnership through the years. Our partnership promotes a unified Christian witness and provides unique opportunities for Lott Carey global family to learn from, encourage, support and inspire each other for kingdom building.
- † Ministry of Public Health: we are grateful for the ongoing partnership with the Guyana Ministry of Public Health at the A. Carlyle Miller Clinic. Because of this partnership thousands of persons receive quality health care benefits.
- † Imago Dei Leadership Development Center Inc (Imago Dei): We express thanks to churches and persons in the Imago Dei networks for supporting GMBC special projects. This partnership has helped to sustain Camp Somerville, and our Christian education program.
- † JBU: We express our deepest appreciation the JBU for collaborating with us to train the next generation of pastoral leaders.

Fellowship

Over the years GMBC has sustained the following fraternal relationships:

Guyana Council of Churches GMBC is a founding member of this ecumenical body and continues to collaborate with this body to strengthen and extend the Christian witness in Guyana

Superintendent, Reverend Brenda K. Harewood, serves on the Executive Committee of GCC.

Deputy Superintendent, Reverend Colleen Anthony, serves as the Christian Representative on The Guyana Rights for the Child Commissions.

Caribbean Baptist Fellowship GMBC is actively involved as Rev. Brenda Harewood serves on the Executive Committee, and as Zone Leader for Eastern Caribbean. GMBC Youth President, Minister Oniqueca

Grenado, serves as Secretary-Treasurer of the Youth Executive Committee.

Minister Shaunessy Profitt serves as Member-at-Large of the Youth Executive Committee.

Conclusion

While this report is reaching you in August, an indicator of the spread of COVID-19 in Guyana may be seen in the statistics of June 30, 2020 from Guyana’s Ministry of Public Health COVID-19 when it reported:

245 confirmed cases; 114 recovered; 1 COVID-19 ICU; 119 institutional isolation; 16 persons in institutional quarantine and 12 deaths.

On March 11, 2020 Guyana confirmed its first case of COVID 19. March 27, Guyana effectively closed all ports of entry and exit and closed its seaports to international vessels and instituted the following preventive measures:

- o Closed all schools.
- o Instituted a national curfew between 6:00 pm and 6:00 am
- o Ordered that all persons must wear a mask in public.
- o Ordered all non-essential businesses closed.
- o Ordered everybody should stay at home except for essential journeys
- o Required that people wait 6ft apart
- o Declared that Public transport may only carry half the number of passengers they are licensed to carry.
- o Ordered all churches and other religious places of worship including mosques and temples closed except to conduct funerals services and weddings. However, Religious groups are permitted to conduct virtual worship services, if number of persons gathered to conduct these services are limited to 5 persons, and they must remain 6 ft apart.

On Thursday March 19, 2020 GMBC Clergy Council met to discuss implications of doing ministry during this global pandemic. We agreed to suspend all gatherings in our churches until further notice, and that we would spend time in prayer and fasting, seeking God’s guidance and direction. We further agreed since GMBC did not have any live-streaming experience or capacity, each pastor should encourage their congregants to worship at home with their families, or to worship virtually on Facebook with a Lott Carey or CBF congregation (list of such congregations was provided).

Thursday March 26, 2020 GMBC Clergy Council met again to explore how we will retain our witness as the Church at work in the today’s world amidst the global

pandemic. Guided by the Holy Spirit and inspired by our core values, we agreed to the following:

- † Our churches should remain closed and we would work collaboratively to utilize all forms of communications available to us to ensure we remain connected to our GMBC family, friends, and neighbors.
- † Sundays, 10:00 am Virtual Worship Service on Facebook
- † Sundays, 5:00 pm GMBC Youth Hangout on Messenger
- † Tuesdays, 6:00 pm Prayer Calls via Messenger Live
- † Wednesdays, 7:00 pm Bible Studies on Facebook Live
- † Saturdays, 6:00 am Prayer Call on Messenger
- † Distribute Food Hampers monthly to needy families in the communities we serve.
- † Develop correspondence Bible studies; and share weekly sermon outline with church communities without internet access.
- † Churches without internet access will receive a monthly pastoral visit, and pastors will work with deacons to ensure congregants receive regular telephone calls of Christian support and encouragement.
- † In April we added Zoom as one of our virtual platforms and moved all activities, except Sunday morning worship, to this platform.
- † On the first Sunday in June we implemented virtual Sunday School on Zoom.
- † In June, we developed virtual learning club to provide academic support for primary and high school children preparing for national and regional exams. Paper versions of these lessons were prepared and distributed to church communities with no internet access.

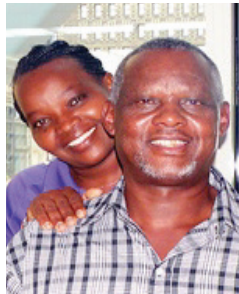

Short History of Lott Carey Baptist Ministries in Kenya

Lott Carey Baptist Ministries commenced in Kenya in 1986. Rev. Hezron K. Cheruiyot is the pioneer, having been commissioned by the late Dr. Wendell C. Sommerville. The mission's first activity was a secondary school in Londiani- between 1986-1992. Lott Carey took over an existing secondary school and managed it until 1992, when it was discontinued due to political interference by local politicians, who had personal interests in the facility.

The Lott Carey organization changed its thrust in 1992, and commenced evangelism and church planting in western Kenya and Sudan. The first church was planted October, 1992 at Kaborok Village. Initially, there were five members. Membership then grew to 50, and today it boasts of 32 churches in 5 counties and 3200 members. There are 20 pastors, 15 laymen and women leaders in each congregation. The church

has birthed other activities, i.e., a clinic, widows & orphans support and coffee plantations.

Thrust of Lott Carey Baptist Ministries in Kenya (Importance)

The primary foci of our work include: evangelism, church planting, provision of medicine, caring for widows & orphans, agriculture and advocacy.

The objective of the ministry is derived from Matthew 28:18-20:

- a) To promote the kingdom of God through preaching, teaching and observing all God's instructions in human life.
- b) To promote and enhance human development, i.e. provision of medicine, economic empowerment through agriculture, water and relief.
- c) To create development models in education and community work through Christian teaching (Acts 19:9-10).
- d) To attempt whenever possible, to assist, our brothers and sisters to achieve food sufficiency through agriculture.
- e) To be a voice for the voiceless by promoting social justice and gender equality.

Impact of Our Ministry

In general terms, we have witnessed tremendous impact and growth in the lives of the people we serve in various areas:

Spiritual — More than 32 congregations across the 5 counties bear witness to the effectiveness and vibrancy of our ministry. Our efforts in evangelism and church planting have borne tremendous fruits. The commitment to the Christian service by many of our leaders has been encouraging.

Advocacy — We have fully participated in conflict resolution. The tribal clashes that occurred in 2007 still simmer around us. We still have occasional tribal flare-ups, like the on-going Narok Mulo, Mau Narok-Likia, and Samburu-Pokot cattle rustling activities.

We have sent many of our representatives to help quell the situations from time to time. We have not hesitated as a church to help in conflict resolution.

Education — Though we don't manage a school anymore, we have contributed our time and monies to needy children. We have used our money from coffee proceeds to pay school fees for secondary school-going students. We have also engaged in fundraising activities

to enable many of our university students to complete their education. From time to time, we are invited to offer spiritual counselling to students in all these institutions.

Economic — The seven acres of the coffee plantation have lifted many families in our church. From the coffee proceeds, we have managed to clear hospital bills for the sick, buy seeds and food for the poor. Many of our members have benefited from the revenue of our coffee. We provide seedlings and fertilizers for their own private plantations. We also sustain our sister ministry in Bor South Sudan through the monies generated from our coffee. Indeed, many of our pastors and laymen get regular salaries and minimal travel allowances from the proceeds.

Challenges — We have many challenges. Many of our pastors have not attended formal Bible seminaries. Many are semi-literate. Our vision is to set up a vocational Bible School in our Koitaburot Parish plot so as to give these pastors and laymen basic biblical knowledge. Many of our partners in the US have expressed a desire to support this venture.

Other challenges include getting enough quarterly support for the medical provisions for our clinic in Kjpsitet. Currently, Maple Springs Baptist Church in Capital Heights, Midland, sends US \$3,500 quarterly. We need US \$6000 to care for approximately 200 patients per day.

Other Challenges

- i) Motor cycles for 4 pastors
- ii) Bicycles for 20 pastors
- iii) Land Rover for Rev. Hezron K. Cheruiyot
- iv) Support for the on-going widows' program
- v) Adequate monthly support

We are also soliciting for US \$20,000 for completion of the Widows' Centre in Kjpsitet.

Opportunities (Special Projects)

Opportunities exist in the following areas of our ministry:

- i) Evangelism- we need instruments to use in our open crusades.
- ii) We welcome our sisters from USA for our annual April women ' s conference.
- iii) We welcome partners from USA to teach and preach in our annual convention, held the last week of August.
- iv) We welcome Lott Carey youth USA to participate in our annual December youth camp.
- v) We require support for 2 more water wells.
- vi) Construction for 10 of our churches, US \$5000 per church.
- vii) Purchase of tractor to take coffee to the factory.
- viii) Purchase of 4 motor cycles and 20 bicycles.

- ix) Construction of a Bible School
- x) Scholarships for students in universities

Conclusion

We solicit support for our on-going work in South Sudan. We are now in our 26th year. We have come a long way. We thank God for His many blessings over the years. We have increased in strength and quality. We pray that the many friends of Lott Carey in the USA will join us in our efforts to promote all our projects.

Rev. Florence C. Cheruiyot, Patron of widows and orphans programmes shares about these ministries:

Women Empowerment Programmes

One of the most major and instrumental developments we have had over the past 15 years are women empowerment programmes. A training centre at our headquarters has served the needs of over 200 widows, grandmothers, single mothers and vulnerable young girls who have dropped out of school, due to lack of school fees or early pregnancies. Many have benefited from this programme since its inception in 2005.

The main focus has been to empower women economically, spiritually, and physically, as well as equipping them with life skills for sustaining a healthy livelihood for themselves and their children. We are grateful for the support given by friends in the USA and in partnership with Lott Carey W.I.S.E. women.

Currently, we have a half-completed center for women at Kjpsitet, which is fully equipped with 20 sewing machines, laptops and computers for training. Other groups of women are engaged in other income generating activities, such as coffee, tea, and nursery beds in various places. They also do poultry keeping as a means of earning a livelihood.

Orphans and Youth Empowerment

Over the past several years, there has been an urge to uplift and empower youth who lack funds for educational development. Among these are young orphaned children whose biological parents have died as a result of illness or accidents; or the children have been abandoned on the streets.

Nineteen such children at Kipchamgaa Hme in Kericho have benefited from the support of brothers of Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church in Philadelphia. These orphans have had their school fees paid in full since 2015. We thank God for the training center for youth who are growing up in one of our mother churches where they have access to a fully-equipped facility with computers, paper, printers and photocopiers. This allows us to train and equip them with much need skills in ICT and other courses.

We bring greetings and blessings to you from of our Convention family. We are forever mindful of the fact that we are in your hearts and prayers constantly as we strive to make an impact on the lives of those we are called to serve in South Africa. We are conscious of God's special

blessings on our land for the political and economic stability we are enjoying, even though we are still faced with high rate of unemployment and corruption. The COVID-19 pandemic has not made our lives easier.

The Baptist Convention of South Africa is so grateful to God for many and varying blessings in all our ministries. We are especially grateful that God has allowed us to focus on missions.

Announcements

- The BCSA has appointed Dr .Thembelani Elvis Jentile from Mamelodi Baptist Church as the General Secretary. Kindly pray for him and his family.
- The BCSA has a relief fund for pastors who may be badly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. By God's grace we seek to develop this fund into a retirement fund for our senior pastors.
- The BCSA received monetary assistance towards the COVID-19 ministries from Lott Carey.
- The BCSA has started with the process of building new offices at our Centre. This was made possible by the Fountain Baptist Church, a partner of Lott Carey.
- The BCSA has lost two pastors due to

COVID-19. The first one was a retired Pastor, who the 3rd person in the country and the first person in the Free State Province to die because of the virus. The other pastor departed in July.

- The BCSA has since opened its head offices, which were closed for three months. However, we postponed all our major events for the year, including the NEC contact meetings, regional conferences and National Assembly.

The context that gave birth to the ministry that you now lead

a. One of the BCSA pillars is the Community Care Ministry:

On the 9th December 2019, Mamelodi Township was hit by floods affecting more than 700 shacks in areas not far from our church (Mamelodi Baptist Church). The rivers started flooding after 9 am. I received calls from church members, the community and affected areas. They called us because in 2017, floods affected the same area, and Mamelodi Baptist housed victims for 5 days. In 2017, the shacks were flooded, but remained intact. This time, the situation was worse as shacks were swept away, along with all of people's belongings. Most of the people in impoverished areas do not bank, they hide their money under the mattresses or in clothes. You can imagine the bonuses and everything they bought on Black Friday for Christmas and New Year were gone in a few hours.

On December 9, 2019 we took in more than 500 people--mostly families, comprised of women, kids and men. By the end of the week we continued to care for 350 people. By January 8, we still had 71 children, and 13 of them were found to be without parents.

The church continued to feed victims three times a day, mainly through the Church's resources and kind donations from individuals, non-profit organizations and some companies. We did not receive any help from the government. Non-perishables and staple foods were donated. Our main challenge has always been perishables: meat, vegetables and fruit. These must be bought in moderation and used as soon as possible.

We had a challenge with pregnant ladies who refused to go to hospital till they had birth-pains. Their argument was it was better to be at Church where they'll be fed and taken care of. But the church didn't have the capacity to care for them, so we engaged the local clinic and the hospital on this matter.

We engaged provincial and local governments about the flood victims, and we were promised a solution before Christmas (25 Dec 2019), but suddenly everyone went on holiday. The political leaders requested we host the people till mid-February. Land to relocate them had been found, about 10 kilometers from the Church, but it needed to be made habitable. That did not happen. We lost all hope in the political leadership both Provincial and local government.

When schools reopened, we were concerned about Birth Certificates and Identity Documents; again, no help was forthcoming. We raised money for school uniforms and fees for about 200 children.

b. How, in general, is the work that goes on now with this ministry like or different from the original focus of the ministry?

Whilst the church was struggling with the flood victims, the world had already started the fight against COVID-19. South Africa followed suit in intensifying its fight against the pandemic. On March 26, 2020, the country was locked down. By then, we had about 60 people staying on our church premises on full-time basis. Others have left to rebuild their shacks or moved to be with their family members. So, due to COVID-19, we had three ministerial obligations.

Feeding/ Soup Kitchen: The lockdown brought a lot of strain on families. Poor people were exposed and surfaced. Because we were already hosting and feeding people who were staying at Church daily, we thought of extending the invitation to the community members who were visibly hungry. We started a feeding scheme for anyone hungry. We served breakfast and late lunch, but people were encouraged to dish and leave so that we do not have many people in the same vicinity at the same time. On the first day we had 210 queuing for hot meals. This attracted soldiers and law enforcement. We explained to them, that people are hungry. They understood

and assisted us with security and social distancing challenges. This ministry continues daily, even on weekends. Sundays are attracting a lot of people, the highest number being 320.

Food Parcels: We have seen God's divine providence during this COVID-19 storm. This pandemic exposed us to the real poverty experienced by brothers and sisters in the country. Hunger was at its highest level. Whilst we were busy with the feeding program, the local community asked for assistance in receiving the promised food parcels from the government. They had a list of 86 people who needed the parcels. We tried our best to reach the government, with no success. God worked mysteriously as two days later, we received the first donation of 100 parcels so all of the 86 people received food! However, that created a serious challenge for us as more people came to look for parcels. So, we approached the Church and friends, asking them to make donations. So far, we have been able to give more than 1000 food parcels to Mamelodi Baptist Church Members, to 55 Pastors in Mamelodi, to 25 Senior Pastors and widows in the Baptist Convention of South Africa. To those we could not reach, we sent food vouchers. Unfortunately, this is unsustainable as we depend mostly on donations. However, we see God's hand in all this mission work. We depend on Him.

Homeless: Since the floods of December, 2019, the local police stations, East and West of Mamelodi, have brought us homeless people. We have received victims of gender-based violence, who needed a safe place for a night or a week. These cases have increased since the lockdown. Also, the police and local hospital have referred to us every person who was left stranded on the streets due to the lock down in our area. These were mostly people from other provinces. The State people added to the number who needed a place to sleep, safety and food. Some people ask for transport money to help them to reach their destinations. We have tried our level best to also feed and distribute food to foreign nationals who have no one to turn to.

What makes this ministry that you presently lead important to the Christian witness today?

Since the dawn of democracy, many people have lost faith in the Church and trusted politicians more than

preachers. The Church left the public space and focused on piety. Our involvement with the community has somehow resurrected trust in the Church as the hope of the poor. This observation was made by our City of Tshwane's chief administrator, Mr. Nawa. One journalist from *The Mail and Guardian* newspaper, asked "What is it about the Baptist Church, that it cares so much about its community?" We explained that ours is a scriptural mandate to manifest the Kingdom of God on earth by making God's blessings available to all. We are convinced that faith without deeds is dead (James 2). Many people have been prayed for and others have pledged to follow Christ and join us. Even though we emphasized we do not help for the purposes of winning people to Church, we help because Christ's love compels us, and that we respect human dignity. Our help has reached people of other Christian denominations, such as Zion Christian Church and other faiths such as the Muslims. Poverty does not discriminate; our love does the same.

Why is your partnership in the global Lott Carey family important?

Lott Carey has always been there for the Baptist Convention of South Africa. The organization is the number one partner in our mission. Besides monthly financial support that goes to our National office for distribution towards our national ministries, the partnership has offered us learning experiences through its conferences, materials and the pastors exchange program, which has benefited our Pastors. Some of our churches have enjoyed the church-to-church partnerships exposing our pastors to mission in the global village.

What are the main areas of ministry impact that happen now and how many people are impacted?

Theological Education: Through our partnership with the Baptist Theological College we managed to register 55 students in 2020. Fourteen of those students are funded by the BCSA. Due to the high number of students we are taking in the BTC program, we need to strengthen administration and lectures. More than 30 ministers were ordained at our 2019 annual assembly. We thank God and see His mercy in our work.

Leadership Training: Rev. Regina Claas, retired Pastor and Rev. Fanyana Mhlophe assist in leadership development initiatives, helping the churches and regions build capacities in financial management.

The Mamelodi Church's ministry alone impacts close to 350 people daily (we keep the record of everyone who

comes for food and those who donate). This includes people who sleep on the church premises (60+), and those who come for a meal on daily bases (230+), and those who receive food parcels daily (50+).

Sino Aya Helping Hands: Drugs Rehabilitation Project works with persons young and old who suffer with addictions and live in the area of Delmas. The program provides daily nutritional food to the children.

Sustainable Sanitary Towel Project - Rural areas Cape Winelands. This project seeks to restore the dignity of girls by having access to educational resources, sanitary hygiene and health interventions.

What opportunities currently exist for special project partnership in the next one to three years?

BCSA is blessed with Land: This land (+21 HA) has the potential of being the main source of income for our mission.

- *Farming:* There is a potential for farming, cattle and sheep breeding, and tilling the land. Recently, we were able to buy garden tools and seeds. We also managed to repair the tractor and the slasher box. We're able to maintain the property and plant.
- *Events Centre:* The intention is to build an events Centre for BCSA, which will be used for annual events such as the Assembly, Conferences and Rallies of our national and regional structures.
- The Church seeks to transform part of its building to a *place of safety for gender-based violence* victims and homeless people in the township, who may need a place for a day or a week. Additionally, we have high levels of poverty, and would love a partnership to help us with food and support for our volunteers.
- Building *low cost housing* for our retired pastors. This will require financial capital for land and building materials. South Africa has a serious backlog of needs for housing, and the government seems to be not coping with the need.

How might Lott Carey partners pray for your work in the coming months?

Introduction

a. *The Context that gave birth to Zimbabwe Theological Seminary*

Zimbabwe Theological Seminary came to being as a result of the need to address a context

characterised by marginalization of women, ignorance, dictatorship tendencies, corruption, violence, poverty, oppression and poor theological education.

In some Christian denominations in Zimbabwe, women were and are being patronised. They are not recognised in faculty, administrative and key church leadership positions, such as the pastorate. Women were not allowed to go beyond the general certificate of education.

Moreover, many pastors were/are receiving poor, if not shallow, theological education, unbalanced academically and spiritually. Because of poverty, pastors could not afford sound theological education. Results are not reflections of abilities, but reflect poverty-stricken backgrounds.

b. *The similarity of the ministry to the original one*

The ministry, Zimbabwe Theological Seminary, is similar to the original ministry in that it is a Christian institution whose primary purpose is to equip God-called men and women of Zimbabwe and the region for effective Christian ministries, particularly in churches and society in general. The Zimbabwe Theological Seminary provides Christ-centered, biblically-based, multifaceted, contextually relevant theological education. In doing this, ZTS seeks to give balanced emphases to the acquisition of knowledge, development of skills, and growth in spiritual maturity and leadership.

The Importance of this Ministry to the Christian Witness Today

Zimbabwe Theological Seminary is important to the Christian witness today because it develops students with spiritual, intellectual and practical skills for empowering churches, in particular, and society in general.

The Importance of our Partnership with Global Lott Carey Family

Our partnership in the Global Lott Carey family is important because the primary focus and mission of Zimbabwe Theological Seminary is met, and it is similar to the priorities and goals of Lott Carey. Lott Carey empowers us to offer theological education in a way fitting our own context, without dictating

to us specifics of the educational program or its development.

Again, the global Lott Carey family opens up doors for interaction with others around the world. In this way, ZTS becomes a family within the whole, and larger Lott Carey family. We, therefore, receive and send various forms of support from everywhere.

Main Areas of Ministry and How People are Impacted

a. The main areas of ministry impact

- **Theological Education to the poor and marginalized**

Zimbabwe Theological Seminary provides Theological Education to poorest of the poor. Zimbabwe is undergoing serious economic meltdown, with inflation running over 785%.

- **Evangelism and Church Planting Needs**

Evangelism, sharing of God's good news, is offered in many ways, and across many areas-- remote areas such as Zaka, Mberengwa, and Chiundura among others, and even in towns, such as Harare, Bulawayo, Masvingo, Kadoma, Gweru, etc.

- **Professional Needs**

We supply different ministries with service providers in various areas, for example, the Ministry of Education through teachers, both primary and secondary; Ministry of Higher Learning and Tertiary Education with lecturers; Ministry of Home Affairs, Defence and Health with chaplains; Ministry of Social and Child Welfare through our social workers; Non-Governmental Organizations through our development officers; Ministry of Justice Legal and Parliamentary Affairs through National Healing and Counsellors. Many churches also benefit from our ministry: Anglican priests, Church of Christ pastors and leaders of other indigenous denominations, are trained at our institution.

b. How many people are impacted

The education we give impacts and changes the lives of many of our students and their families, and the community at large.

- Women are impacted
- Whole Zimbabwean community is impacted
- Churches are impacted
- The Marginalised/Disadvantaged/less

privileged are impacted

Opportunities Currently Existing for Special Project Partnership

If opportunities present, we look forward to partnering in purchasing land and construction of our own seminary facilities. Owning property and facilities are our greatest priority now. We need prayers and finances to support us in achieving this great vision.

Lott Carey Partners in Prayers

The Lott Carey Partners may join us in prayer for the following:

- *The need for our own premises:* A lot of funds are being used for rental fees for the premises we use. Pray for God's intervention and provision of funds for buying land and the construction of the Seminary.

We join with the global family in celebrating the joys of the past year, while sharing in the challenges and difficult moments experienced by many across the globe, given the harsh impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. We extend special greetings to the President, Rev. Dr. Gregory Jackson, and the Executive Secretary/Treasurer, the Rev. Emmett Dunn.

Profile of Ministry

TEM started with a vision of making the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ known to all, especially those in poor and vulnerable situations. Soon the Lord led the founder, Pastor George Coore to a poor rural community in St. Mary, Jamaica, bearing the name “Retreat,” where he brought the love of Jesus to bear on the people of the area.

The ministry has evolved over time offering various services to the community, and currently offers skills training in light of the high level of unemployment and poverty faced by many residents in Retreat.

Importance of Lott Carey Partnership

Our partnership with Lott Carey is important given the global nature of mission, and therefore, the need to build relationships and partnerships in order to fulfil the mandate of Jesus Christ. The importance of

reverse mission should also be emphasized. We hope more of this can be realized over time.

Main areas of Ministry Impact

Skills Training The Skills Training Centre is intended to give at-risk young adults another chance at life. The centre is operated in partnership with a Government of Jamaica (GOJ) training agency, namely HEART/NTA. Students in this programme are drawn from Retreat and other surrounding communities.

A critical ministry is provided by offering opportunities for personal growth and development, further education and job opportunities which arise from training in areas of Commercial Food Preparation, Restaurant Server, Villas and other Properties, and Early Childhood Development.

The Centre provides courses with short cycles. Within any given year, two sets of students are trained in these areas. A total of ninety-five (95) students were trained during the year with an employable skill.

We celebrate this achievement because it means more families will benefit from the opportunity to learn a skill, and consequently be in a position to care for themselves and their families. TEM employs seven persons who provide support to the training programme. We also benefit from volunteers who provide assistance through a community management committee, volunteer teachers, and an annually-elected board.

Early Childhood Education The Centre celebrates the existence of an early childhood institution which offers training to children of preschool years. The average enrolment is 40 students. We are grateful to the Friendship Missionary Baptist Church, through the leadership of Rev. Dr. Clifford Jones who partners with Lott Carey in providing funding for the school. Every effort is being made to make the school a best-in-class institution. Scholarship is provided to allow students to attend at a minimal cost. Breakfast is provided each morning as a means of offering nutritional support.

Both programmes, Skills Training and Early Childhood Education, were impacted for a sustained period by a national closure of educational institutions due to COVID-19.

Opportunities for special project partnership

The centre is in dire need of an upgrade of IT infrastructure, inclusive of at least twenty-five

(25) computers in order to adequately conduct skills training and early childhood programmes. Our goal to provide the best to those whom God has entrusted to our care needs your partnership in this vital area.

Prayer Request

Help us pray we will be able to continue to fulfil our mandate in serving the Retreat Community despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. Regulations/requirements, such as physical distancing, place greater demands on the limited resources of the centre. We seek to be compliant in the best interest of those whom we serve.

Conclusion

We continue to be grateful to God for the partnership between Lott Carey and Trinity Evangelical Ministries. We believe, even in these challenging economic times, we can accomplish great things as we partner in the Mission of Jesus Christ.

Dear Lott Carey Family,



We hope and pray this report finds you well. We also greet you with a heavy heart, for what is happening to the world needs our thoughts and prayers. As always, our lives and mission are blessed by our friendship and partnership with you.

In 1997, while I was in Ethiopia visiting family, I was made aware of, by a friend, the crises of HIV/AIDS pandemic facing the country. According to the report he was citing, estimated HIV-infected individuals were 2.6 million. AIDS was the leading cause of death among the young and productive segment (15-49 age group) of the Ethiopian population.

East Africa was and still is affected by this pandemic. Women and children contribute 50% of all cases. More than half a million infected children are born to HIV infected mothers, and an estimated 7.8 million children ages 14 and younger have been orphans in Sub-Saharan Africa.

To date, there is no cure. Drugs are not accessible due to their high cost.

The last words my friend said to me were “I hope and pray you will help your people.” That was when I decided to organize the first world conference to break the silence and to create awareness. The conference

was held November 7-10, 1999. Right after the conference, African AIDS Initiative international (AAII) was established.

The primary focus of our work with AAII is more or less the same, we are still tackling HIV/AIDS. With the help of the Lott Carey family, we have added mobile testing centers to provide reproductive health counseling, emergency contraceptives, and pregnancy tests.

It is still our mission to curb the spread of HIV/AIDS pandemic. AAII emphasizes teaching awareness, gives people knowledge of HIV status, and helps them make decisions to protect themselves and people around them from spreading the disease.

Our relationship with the Lott Carey family is very important because we could not do what we are doing without your help. Without Lott Carey, we have said over and over, we would not be able to reach enough people to create awareness, conduct testing on location, or provide nutritional and medical help wherever they are needed. Lott Carey has lately afforded us the means and opportunity to give assistance to university students with disabilities.

Lott Carey has been supporting our fight against HIV/AIDS pandemic since 2006. But, due to the Coronavirus pandemic that the whole world is facing right now, understandably, it has been difficult to receive the financial help our mission needs at the present time. We ask the Lott Carey family to pray for us and the whole world. Those prayers are needed more than ever right now.

Short-Term Missions (STM)

- Lott Carey hosted **seven** (7) teams with **102** participants who traveled to Kenya, Puerto Rico and Nassau, Bahamas.
- Due to the continued unrest in Haiti, STM assignments are on hold.
- Lott Carey continued to serve in Puerto Rico to assist in repairing homes and replacing roofs damaged during Hurricane Maria. **Four** (4) teams have served our American Baptist Convention (ABC) partner churches in Puerto Rico.
- Due to COVID-19, STMs scheduled in April, May and July have been cancelled. Cuba has been rescheduled for November 2020. The other trips will be rescheduled in 2021.

U.S. Disasters

Harvey Restoration Grant The goal of the Red Cross Hurricane Harvey (18-month, \$1.646 million) grant was to repair 91 homes, and to provide spiritual care and disaster preparedness training to families in Harris, Orange and Jefferson counties of Texas.

- The grant was completed successfully on March 31, 2020.
- Repaired 93 primary homes
- To date we have over **9,100** volunteer service hours
- Engaged **1049** people in community outreach efforts
- Outreach services were completed at **26** churches
- Provided spiritual care to **200** unique individuals
- Installed **113** smoke detectors

Florence Recovery Grant Lott Carey was awarded a 7-month, \$169,601 Red Cross Hurricane Florence grant to provide spiritual care and disaster

preparedness training in six (6) North Carolina counties: Wayne, Lenoir, Johnson, Greene, Dublin and Wilson Counties. To date, the staff of 10 achieved these results:

- The grant was completed successfully on March 31, 2020.
- Engaged **2,265** persons in disaster preparedness and mold awareness training
- Connected with **26** churches to provide disaster preparedness training
- Distributed disaster preparedness information via Neighborhood Canvassing or Media Campaigns to **232,970** people/families
- Services Performed (for grantee or other agencies) by number of unique volunteers **89**
- Completed **52** Disaster Preparedness Trainings
- Installed **151** smoke detectors

COVID-19 Pandemic

- Disaster Services has provided informational faith-based resources in the midst of COVID-19, including funding information (such as PPP and EIDL), as well as re-opening resources and more. The information is being shared on Lott Carey's website, enabling our constituents to access up-to-date information. We are also checking in with our International Partners on a regular basis.
- Booz Allen Foundation Grant: Lott Carey applied for the BAH Innovation Fund to provide tools for vulnerable seniors who are unable to return to church, even after churches reopen.
- We continue to search for other grant opportunities. Even though Lott Carey is not eligible to apply for most; several opportunities have been communicated to churches and associations to support funeral homes, and small business, including female-owned businesses.

International Disasters (Hurricane Dorian)

Lott Carey joined a delegation of the African American Baptist Mission Collaboration (AABMC) for a site visit to Nassau and Abaco to assess the damages, and to determine the level of support to be given to the Bahamas National Baptist Missionary & Education Convention (BNBMEC). During and following the visit we asked the BNBMEC to provide and send a budget of the costs. Since the BNBMEC seemed to have a problem detailing the information, we sent a Project Proposal form in early January. BNBMEC finally admitted that they needed help completing the form. We assisted the BNBMEC in completing the form, and once again requested a budget. A detailed budget and implementation plan were never received

from BNBMEC.

Lott Carey-NBCA Disaster Services Network

Over 500 Lott Carey and National Baptist Convention of America, Inc. volunteers throughout the U.S. are serving alongside the Red Cross to support local, regional and national disasters.

Lott Carey received the **Volunteer Organization of the Year Award, at the 2nd Annual Disaster Red Cross Summit in Washington, D.C.** for demonstrating our commitment to preparing all communities, including traditionally underserved communities throughout the region, training people how to plan for and respond to a wide variety of disasters, promoting drives to ensure there is a ready supply of lifesaving blood, and organizing volunteers for community preparedness events such as our Sound the Alarm Smoke Alarm Installations.

22 Operations Contacts meet monthly to provide updates and accomplishments regarding Lott Carey – NBCA activities in their local regions. Also, we meet to discuss local disasters, issues that may arise and preparedness for the upcoming hurricane season.

Special Projects

Flint Refresh

Flint Refresh, a family and children's nutrition intervention pilot program, provides produce, health education, and cooking demonstrations to families most impacted by the water crisis and lead poisoning.

- Kick-off was July 1, 2019 with the first meetings with families in September 2019.
- The program, funded by donations totaling \$120K, is currently providing on-going support for up to 34 families, while continuing to recruit other families.
- Due to COVID-19, staffing for the project ended on May 16, 2020. So that the families do not suffer, boxes of fruits and vegetables will be distributed through June.
- The Flint Refresh Project ends on June 30, 2020.

Mission of Grace - Haiti

The MOG is on its second month of lock down. Our clinic continues to see patients 5 days a week and continues to use all precautions necessary to keep everyone safe. The soup kitchen is running well. MOG continues to feed approximately 200 people per day.

School Construction

Mount Olive Baptist Church of Arlington, VA and First Baptist Church of North Brentwood Maryland committed \$88,412 to complete the Mission of Grace

School in Carries, Haiti. Final payment was made in October 2019 to complete the final construction to the school's top floor with 7 new classrooms, a Library, Computer Lab and 2 new Administrative Offices.

The completion of the school will make the following impact:

- Increase school enrollment from 209 students to 375 students.
- Expand the grade-level to include students up to the 13th grade. Unlike U.S. schools, Haiti schools are structured from Kindergarten to grades 13.
- If the administration decides to go to ½ day classes, the increased school size also provides an option to double the number of students.

Security Force

This portion of the project ended in early September 2019. During unrest which impacted Mission of Grace in late 2018 and well into 2019, sixteen homes (including 3 Lott Carey homes), the Medical Clinic and the School Administration Building were burned down in the community and all of the solar equipment was stolen. Lott Carey provided a six-month \$24,000 stipend to support training and hiring of thirty (30) Armed Guards to provide much needed security at the Mission of Grace church, school, orphanage, seniors home, boys home, soup kitchen and Ocean View Hotel.
