Giving Circles An Old Idea Made New

he challenge for any group involved in kingdom building on earth is finding the resources to do so – both the faithful and the finances. According to *Philanthropy Together*, "documented

giving circles are hundreds of years old! ... [The] model spans the globe and goes by many names, from "susu" in West Africa to "tanda" in Mexi-



co." Giving circles are not new to congregations supportive of Lott Carey. Since 1970, the Lott Carey-Rebecca Mullins Foreign Missions Club, based within four communities in Virginia, has designated the fourth Sunday in April as its Missions Day. The "Fasting to Feed the Hungry" campaign asks people within the Chatham, Danville, Dry Fork and Ringgold communities to donate the cost of a meal. These communities then pool their contributions and

make a gift to Lott Carey.

With an appreciation for the potential of giving circles, WISEinitiated regional giving circle teams create giving circles in designated areas. Lo-

cal churches are invited to participate and receive support with various fundraising ideas. The teams plan and implement activities throughout the year to generate financial support for Lott Carey. Two such examples follow.

Tidewater Regional Giving Circle

Several churches in the Tidewater area of Virginia comprise this giving circle. As the leader of the Tidewater Regional Giving Circle of WISE, we encourage personal and group projects to assist with the needs of women globally. We have provided disposable sanitary napkins, toiletries, t-shirt dresses, and school supplies for women in the U.S. and abroad. "Dimes for Zimbabwe" and "Nickels for Nigeria," are examples of two campaigns that provided funds for special projects in these countries. We share Lott Carey's goals and objectives with other missionaries and churches in our area. Additionally, circle member congregations are encouraged to participate in other WISE initiatives – Thursdays in Black, the awesome Digital Couch sessions, monthly prayer calls, and 31 Days of Prayer and Giving as well as the virtual Spring Conference and Annual Session. Each one can reach one because we are SALT – serving and learning together.

Incarceration" facilitated by Rev. Dr. Harold Dean Trulear *to "Pandemic Pastoral Care"* facilitated by Rev. Dr. David Emmanuel Goatley and Dr. Jacqueline Madison-McCreary, there's something for everyone – youth, lay men and women, and the clergy. W.I.S.E.

will host a special breakout session, "A Candid Conversation of Being Made in the Image of God," on Tuesday. Rev. Brenda K. Harewood and Rev. Dr. Gina Steward will lead the discussion. These breakout sessions are great opportunities for you to learn, grow and engage to be able to make an even larger impact in missions.

Start Time: 7:00 PM **Worship**. Each day will end with a spirit-filled, uplifting service of worship. Rev. Carl A. Pace, Jr., Pastor of True Light Baptist Church, Grand Rapids, MI, and Rev. Dr. TaNikka Sheppard, President of Baptist Women of North America, will be the Tuesday and Wednesday night preachers, respectively.

SEE, I Am Doing A New Thing

Editor's Note

istoric, momentous, and unprecedented are just a few words to describe the tenure of outgoing Lott Carey President, Rev. Gregory Jackson. He has led this community faithfully during a global pandemic which upended everything we do. Yet we pressed on. We thank him for his steadfast leadership in challenging times. We now come to a momentous occasion in the life of Lott Carey – the election of Rev. Dr. Gina Stewart as our first woman president.

Rev. Jackson and Dr. Stewart took time to share their thoughts and reflect on their leadership roles and Lott Carey experiences as part of our **Digital Couch** series hosted by **Sister Doriel Larrier**. The Digital Couch is broadcast live on the first Thursday of each month. The following are *select* excerpts from interviews with Rev. Jackson and Rev. Dr. Stewart. You can view these interviews in their entirety on the Lott Carey WISE YouTube channel or in the WISE SALT Facebook group. The excerpts have been edited for clarity.

Reverend Gregory Jackson, President

Rev. Jackson is the Pastor Emeritus of Mount Olive Baptist Church in Hackensack, NJ, where he has served for 37 years.

Your Lott Carey Story

I started coming to Lott Carey reluctantly. I was a new pastor when Mrs. [Alice] Somerville came to Mount Olive. She would come every year. And that first year, I was 33 years old at the time, she said y'all let that boy come and I will pay for him. And she did. She paid for my trip and it was in Louisville, KY. I

> fell in love. It expanded my horizon, my vision, my thinking. Meeting her and being exposed to wonderful people has changed my life. She not only asked me, but she invested in me and I think that made the difference.

Supporting Home and Global Missions

It's a transformative journey to not fight the church over home mis-

sions, but just finding a new niche to ask people to give for global missions. I maintain God's got money in people's pockets segmented for certain kinds of things. When you get the right niche in a person's thinking, psyche and theology, they will give to it.

Making a Difference Globally with Our Presence

I recommend to any pastor to go on a mission trip with that purpose in mind to open your eyes and see how we can make a difference. We go to walk alongside people, love them, encourage them, pray for them and do the very best that we can. Hopefully, the gospel will intersect with the lives of those people. We're able to do a lot with technology now in terms of talking to people in the various countries around the world, but there's no substitute for being on the ground.

Lott Carey's Transformative Work

[We meet] the needs of people in terms of focus, education, ministry, or healthcare by being flexible and adaptive to whatever is happening on the ground. A few years ago it was HIV and AIDS. In other places it has been water initiatives in Michigan, or food initiatives in Zimbabwe, or dealing with some drought. In the States, it's been natural disasters, down in Louisiana [for example]. It seems like there's a natural disaster every time you turn around – whether it's in Haiti or whatever. Every-thing is transformative if you can make a difference in somebody's life. If you can step up and be there, and bring whatever resources you have to bear. We never have enough resources, but we come in the name of Jesus Christ. So we pray, we hold their hands and we minister together with people depending upon what's happening in their lives.

Words of Advice to Dr. Gina Stewart

Do what you've been doing. Be yourself. Love people. Just go for it. *God's got you!*

Dr. Stewart is the senior pastor of Christ Missionary Baptist Church where she has served for 26 years. She is an adjunct professor at Virginia Union University for the School of Theology and is currently pursuing a PhD in African American preaching and sacred rhetoric.

Inspiring Women Leaders Globally

Lott Carey has strategic priorities which will help make it a more seamless type of transition. My responsibility, as I see it, is to come in and help to further advance and amplify those strategic priorities. Before I begin planning what I want to do with global leaders, I would be interested to hear what some of those needs are [from] some of our female leaders in global ministry. I know that some of the needs include equipping, training, education, empowerment, those kinds of things. The easiest way to do it is to plug into the strategic priorities that are already there. Lott Carey already has a major commitment to human trafficking. That's something I'd like to see us amplify. And, of course, as it relates to mentoring, and as mentoring leaders, training leaders and things like that would be some of the things that immediately come to mind. But it is important to have a conversation first about how we can work in solidarity with women and be a blessing in this new assignment.

Challenges for Women in Leadership Roles

One of the things you have to realize when you're in a position like this or leadership in general is there's always resistance to leadership. There are certain things that just go with the territory and understanding that helps with expectations. Learning to depersonalize the way that people respond to us is critical. We need the energy and the passion and the resolve to keep moving forward. The other thing when we're in roles like this, we do have to challenge those instances from time to time when the opportunity presents itself. We do have to challenge the ways that people interact with women and with people in leadership.

Your Lott Carey Story

I remember the first convention that I attended was in Louisville, Kentucky. I was listening to all of the great things that Lott Carey was doing, and I heard Dr. Peterson say that Alfred Street was giving Lott Carey \$25,000. I was just amazed that a church would invest that kind of money in missions. I remember going to my hotel room, getting on my knees, and asking God to bless our church, so that we could give like that. That was the only ambition I had. I believed in the mission, and I wanted our church to partner and invest in this kind of work. But of course, many are the plans in a woman's heart, but it's the purpose of the Lord that prevails. I'm amazed by what a yes to God will do and where a yes to God will lead you.

An Old Idea Made New

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North Carolina Woman's Baptist Home & Foreign Missionary Convention

The Woman's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention Auxiliary is launching two mission campaigns for 2021. The "Christ in Every Home" project supports the work of the Salvation Army in helping the homeless. We want to be a positive force as these neighbors move from homelessness to stable housing.

The convention members, representing numerous churches, will also dedicate efforts to providing maize seed for families in Zimbabwe. Made aware of the shortfall in Lott Carey's need to continue providing maize seed to 2,500 families in Zimbabwe, the convention will respond to this clarion call for help. The 40lb bag of seed represents a brighter future and economic sustainability. It is our goal to be an instrument of empowerment for our neighbors in Zimbabwe. Our Beginnings...

Dear Readers: This information is an account of the minutes of the *first* meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention.

After the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention had operated for three years, the officers and members decided to accept Christian women as co-workers in the Body. To that end its president, Dr. C. S. Brown, called a meeting during the annual session held in Shiloh Baptist Church, Alexandria, VA, August 31, 1900. After making plain the vital need of a Woman's Department, organization was in order. The following persons served on the nominating committee: Mrs. Pattie Sheppard (NC), Mrs. Ella Gallery (MD), Miss M. A. Webb (PA), Miss Atlanta L. Brown (VA) and Mrs. N. Weaver (DC). During the period of waiting impressive talks were made. The Committee submitted its report, which was accepted, and the following were elected to serve on the official staff:

President – **Mrs. Alice E. James** (Pennsylvania) 1st Vice President – **Mrs. I. Toliver** (Washington D. C.) 2nd Vice President – **Mrs. Ellen Gallery** (Baltimore, MD) 3rd Vice President – **Miss Atlanta Brown** (Fredericksburg, VA) Recording Secretary – **Miss A. C. Morris** (Winston Salem, NC) Corresponding Secretary – **Miss M. C. Webb** (Pittsburg, PA) Treasurer – **Mrs. Rebecca Callis** (Baltimore, MD)

These resolutions were adopted:

RESOLVED, That the name of the organization shall be the Woman's Auxiliary of the Carey Foreign Mission Convention. **RESOLVED**, That the annual meeting shall be at the same time and place as the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention. **RESOLVED**, That the Constitution of the Convention shall be the same as that of the Foreign Mission Convention. **RESOLVED**, That the officers for the first year shall constitute Executive Board.

The total amount of money reported was **\$10.60**.
