Where God guides, God provides. — Isaiah 58:11 paraphrased

n September of 2021, a woman was kicked in the chest by a male perpetrator. The blow had such force she nosedived off the escalator, collapsing on the concrete in a New York City subway tunnel. In October of 2021, a sister was manhandled by a stranger for forty minutes on a subway train in Philadelphia. In the city of Brotherly Love, a daughter of God was raped while bystanders on the train recorded the assault for social media.

In December of 2021, a pregnant mother of two was beaten and abducted by her boyfriend while at work in Florida. Her remains were found by a cadaver dog in a wooded area. Her boyfriend was arrested and charged with her murder.

The pandemic has brought historically rooted inequalities into view. Throughout the global community, human rights violations against

young girls and women are on the rise. They are kidnapped, molested, lured into trafficking, and physically and sexually assaulted. These are lives forever changed by trauma. The saddest part of it all is the silence in society, especially in the sanctuary. The quiet is deafening.

Intersectionality, a term coined by legal scholar Kimberlé Crenshaw, reveals how structural gendered racism shapes the perception, position, practice, pay, primary care, and the overall



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psyche of women and girls around the world. Globally, an estimated 736 million women—almost one in three—have been subjected to intimate partner violence, non-partner sexual violence, or both at least once in their lifetime. Just ruminate on that staggering statistic for a moment. One in every three of your female friends has experienced violence.

In 2022, the WISE leadership team is calling everyone to get involved in five ways:

- 1. Pausing to increase awareness about the intersectionality of sexism and racism.
- 2. Praying to end structural gendered racism fueling violence against women.
- Pledging your support for the Lott Carey WISE social media campaign, Thursdays in Black, in partnership with the World Council of Churches and the Ecumenical Women at the United Nations.
- 4. Posting your selfies on various social media platforms on Thursdays,



It is sad to see that in many churches we are only allowed to help in the kitchen and in no way can we serve during the worship service.



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


Lord, I ask that You give Ghana strength to love one another as You love. Give Ghana the courage to stand up for right relationship and cast down every evil thought against it.





You are the God who sees Geneva Reed-Veal (Sandra Bland's mother) in the middle of the night when the memory of her daughter is both comforting and lingering. We pray for all the unnamed mothers and women who must be courageous for themselves and others; for the Black woman who is called out of her name because she dares to be assertive. She may cry when no one is looking but she is fierce in the boardroom with her "feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace," as recorded in Ephesians 6:15 NIV.

We pray for all the Aunt Pats of the world; women who will face racism and sexism, and pay with their lives; women who gained their wings in heaven. The world might not have appreciated their presence, but God has always seen them as precious. God, be with us as we work to ensure that all are seen. In Jesus' name. Amen.

dressed in black, standing in solidarity with women victimized by gender-based violence.

5. Participating each morning on the 31 Days of Prayer call. We invite 100 prayer warriors to invite 10 other prayer warriors to join the 6 a.m. ET call. You do the math: 1,000 seasoned saints called and committed to give \$31.00 or more supporting women's empowerment makes a powerful statement while commemorating the Rev. Lott Carey's Bicentennial Anniversary.

Lauding the Rev. Lott Carey, his return to Liberia, and serving the least of these while celebrating the 10th Anniversary of the 31 Days of Prayer is no coincidence. Pause for a moment and reflect on why God allowed these two occasions to collide. Pray for the sight and sensitivity of El Roi, to decolonize a colonized consciousness normalizing violence against women.

Pledge your support, as we envision a world free of abuse. I challenge you to recognize how weaponizing blame and shame negatively impacts sisters, victimized by gender-based violence. Let's not continue the cycle of trauma. Let's not use the gospel to gaslight women, making them doubt their lived experiences. Let's not do any additional harm. Instead let's use our time, talents, and treasures wisely as we strive to dismantle structural gendered racism in the global community. Remember, together we are stronger.
